The National Black Church Initiative Orders a 72 Hour Moratorium on Protests in Baton Rouge and Minnesota in Honor of Slain Police Officer but not in Cleveland

Cleveland, we must take it to the politicians

Washington, DC – The National Black Church Initiative (NBCI), a faith-based coalition of 34,000 churches comprised of 15 denominations and 15.7 million African Americans, is honoring the request of police leadership in both Baton Rouge and Michigan to hold off on protests for 72 hours in honor of the slain policemen. We are very happy to honor those requests by the police leadership in both of those cities and feel very strongly, that those who truly serve and protect the interests of all citizens should be honored. But those police who target the African American community unfairly, we will continue to apply nonviolent pressure until they respect us. The shooting yesterday is completely heartrending and we feel for the families who are affected. This is why we will take the unusual step in making sure that none of our members and those who we have a coalition with like Black Lives Matter will honor this moratorium

Rev. Anthony Evans, President of the National Black Church Initiative says, "I've heard the plea of our brethren, General Russel L. Honoré who demonstrated a sense of humanity when he forced the National Guards to lower their weapons around the victims of Katrina and demanded that they be treated like human beings and Americans. We would observe this moratorium for the next 72 hours and then we will begin to plan more nonviolent peaceful demonstrations in those cities according to our overall strategies. But we will not do this in Cleveland whereby we are taking our grievance straight to the political parties and we will also do this in Philadelphia

when the Democrats throw their convention. No one will ever take our authority away to lay down our grievances peacefully in nonviolence, but as the Church our hearts are broken concerning the slain officers in both Dallas and Baton Rouge."
