NBCI is Outraged that Democrats and Republicans Are Balancing the Budget on the Backs of the Poor

Politicians Are Unfairly Targeting the Poor and African Americans

Washington DC – The National Black Church Initiative (NBCI), a faith-based coalition of 34,000 churches comprised of 15 denominations and 15.7 million African Americans, is outraged that both Democrats and Republicans are attempting to balance the budget on the backs of the poor. During this time of severe economic unrest, our fragile nation can ill afford to harm those least able to weather this storm.

President Obama's campaign motto was "Change". Americans believed that he would be a different type of president - that he would be a staunch supporter of the Democratic ideal of defending the poor, supporting the middle-class and creating a fair and balanced society. President Obama was voted into office on the platform that he would depart from former President Bush's policies. However, we have received a Bush-like presidential term that has ignored the poor and caved into Republican pressures to destroy the safety net respectfully upheld for over sixty years.

No one would have ever believed that President Barack Obama would have been an advocate for radically slashing the budget, ignoring the needs of his Democrat supporters to appease the radical Republicans' interests: less government, single-minded support of big business, big defense budgeting and radical reprioritizing of social programming that depends on a carrot and stick approach.

We are prepared to oppose President Obama and Republicans alike in an all out public policy fight for the soul of this country. Such radical social program budget cutting in

light of this double-dip recession is not only unethical but morally reprehensible."
