Washington, DC – The National Black Church Initiative (NBCI) is a coalition of 34,000 African American and Latino churches working to eradicate racial disparities in healthcare, technology, education, housing, and the environment. The Black Church has for over 250 years supported the Arts due to Jim Crow laws in America. The Black Church continues to use its facilities to stage plays, musicals, recitals, and other artistic expressions. *The Mountaintop*, which is a play that characterizes of one of America's greatest churchmen, Martin Luther King Jr., is a clear illustration that the Black Church has an intimate relationship with the theatre and the Arts. That is why we are encouraging all of our members to go see it."

The Mountaintop in some respects is controversial, but many would say that about the activism of the Black Church. As such, this play merely mirrors the struggle, the activism and the genius of the actors, namely Samuel L. Jackson and Angela Bassett. Both of these actors represent the finest tradition of not only the Black Theatre, but the also the Black Church.

The Black Church is the impetus that has encouraged performances such as Jackson and Bassett, to only be good and acceptable, but to strive for greatness and to create a new level of artistic expression that will clearly dramatize the heroic and the classical cultural history of the African American experience in America.

Recently, we dedicated the MLK Memorial in Washington DC (both Samuel L. Jackson and Angela Basset were founding members of the 'Dream Team' – a group of celebrities who donated their resources to support the Memoral). The Memorial is an expression of a grateful nation who rose above the petty differences of the human experience and sought to identify and acknowledge the deep humanity of people, regardless of race, creed, religion, or any other barriers that keep one human being from acknowledging another. *The Mountaintop* is where the church wants everyone to reach to. NBCI urges everyone to go attend the play.
